The Mid Atlantic Peony Society held their second “Dig and Divide” workshop and first auction on October 9th at the Wister Center on the campus of Swarthmore College through the generosity of the Scott Arboretum. Thirty-three people attended the event which has been the most highly attended meeting since the organization has been formed.

Jeff Jabco and Eleanor Tickner demonstrated how to dig , divide and plant all three types of peonies. The demonstration was held outside in sunny, 80 degree weather. The feedback from participants was that the information was very helpful for novices as they had bought

peonies at the plant sale and wanted to “get it right”. Other members of the audience benefited from hearing from the experts on how to handle intersectionals which are becoming more available for our home gardens.

The event moved back indoors for some seasonal apple cider, cheese spread and an array of desserts. Fall favorites including apple cake and peanut butter cookies were some of the options. Gerri and Bernie made sure that tasty treats provided lots of choices for guests and members.

The auction was held once the audience had a chance to check out the offerings. There were

tree, intersectionals and herbaceous peonies that had been donated by MAPS members and the Scott Arboretum. There were some rare tree peonies not available in the commercial trade on the auction block. The fundraiser pulled in several hundred dollars and members left with winners to place in their gardens.

Every two years the Scott Arboretum sponsors a fall fundraiser and brings in hundreds of hard to find and excellent varieties of plants to plant in the Delaware Valley. They have been wonderful to work with and allow MAPS to participate in the sale and set up a tent for the three day event.

In return for their generosity we donate peonies to their collection that help with their educational mission and com-

pliments our mission. We have used their collection on multiple occasions for tours and lectures on the growing habits and varieties.

New Kid on the Block

MAPS provides us with opportunities to acquire some of the latest varieties being developed. This year was no exception.

The plant highlighted is called "Allan Rodgers". Eleanor shared with us that this plant was registered in 2008 but took until this year for the plant to be available to the buying public.

Allen Rodgers is 90 years old. He was for many decades the owner of Caprice Farms in Sherwood, one of Oregon's first peony specialists and author of one of the most popular and authoritative books on the subject, obtained much of his original stock from the Marx Nursery in Boring, OR.

This namesake is a beautiful

double white flowering herbaceous peony. Many of us can look forward to comparing the flowers in the upcoming years.
